Beginning in 2007, daylight saving time (DST) will be extended in the United States. DST will start on March 11, 2007, which is three weeks earlier than usual, and it will end on November 4, 2007, which is one week later than usual. This results in a new DST period that is four weeks longer than in previous years. Unless certain updates are applied to your computer, the time zone settings

for your computer's system clock may be incorrect during this four-week period. In particular, you must make sure that both your Windows operating system and your calendar programs are updated. When the DST dates change in March 2007, BlackBerry® devices will not update their clocks for the affected time zones if no patches for impacted BlackBerry software and third party software are applied. As a result, your BlackBerry device might not display correct time zone information for certain time periods during the year.

WOS Tech Tip

Voiding a Prior Year Check Without Affecting Prior Year Balances

Solution: Make a deposit back into the bank account

1. Click on 1-1(General Ledger>Checks / Bank Charges) to open a new transaction.
2. Click on the **Posting period** to post to current period.
3. Put in the appropriate cash account in the **account number** field, **check number, date voiding, and description.**
4. In line 1 of the grid only enter the offsetting account where the check was originally posted, enter in the amount as a negative number. This will force the voiding of the check.

Note: This will not update the vendor if this was originally processed through A/P; it will be placed correctly in the bank reconciliation.
